TAMPA, Fla. -- Mike Alstott (Pg. 438) looked up from the stool in front of his locker, appearing mildly surprised with the Tampa Bay Bucs trivia just relayed to him. His 3l-yard touchdown in Sunday's 20-10 wild-card! playoff victory over the Detroit Lions is the longest run in Tampa Bay's brief Playoff history.

Writing A Family 's Story

Quest for roots leads to chronicle of Allstotts

By DIANE GETTMANN of the East Oregonian

HEPPNER -- When Jerry Allstott came from central Texas to Oregon on a vacation, he was looking for Allstotts. But he had no idea he would write a book containing more than 300 years of family history.

"I came to Hermiston and 1ooked up the Rev. Robert Allstott but he had died. So I went to Don Allstott's," said Jerry. "It happened that the family was having a reunion," he said, and Jerry met more Allstotts than he dreamed. "Still it took me about three years to find where I fit in the family line," Jerry said.

His curiosity was first peaked by a commercial book offered in the mail and listing all the Allstotts in the United States. He purchased the book and that led him to Oregon searching for Allstotts. The Heppner Allstotts had traced their heritage to a German immigrant. A cousin, Pat Wilcox Kennedy, helped Jerry search for his connection to them. Their search identified 28 Allstott immigrants, "all that ever came over from Germany" said Jerry.

Although he has found his roots in Germany, Jerry says, "Basically we're Americans. We were here before it was a country and Allstotts have fought in every war since The Revolution."

Encouraged by the late Don Allstott, Jerry compiled that first research effort into a book in 1984. "When I talked to Don about the book he said,'I want it all.' meaning he wanted to know all the family history."

That first effort had whetted Jerry's appetite, too. "I found that every family has someone who is the keeper of the pictures. That person is usually the family historian," he said. By contacting them, Jerry began to fill in the blanks on the family tree.

There are 75+ historians who helped put together

the second book, and the funny thing was none of us knew one another before we started," he said.

With the help of many family "historians," they compiled a history of all the Allstotts (all spellings*) that immigrated to the United States including Johann Casper Alstadt, who was born and died in Dreieichenhain, Germany, 1673-1742. Johann's son, Johann Martin immigrated to Pennsylvania in 1729 and land deeds show he was a neighbor of the grandfathers of Daniel Boone and Abraham Lincoln. "The lines never married, of course, because we were Lutherans and they were Quakers," Jerry explained.

In 1989, after his first book, the Allstotts had their first national family reunion. They chose the site of the Allstadt ancestors homestead in historic Harper's Ferry, WV.

One gem in his book is the story of John Allstadt and his son at Harper's Ferry who were taken hostage with Col. Washington, nephew of President George Washington, by John Brown and his men. They were rescued by Col. Robert E. Lee and J.E.B. Stewart at the Armory in Harpers Ferry. John Allstadt's testimony at John Brown's trial is part of the historical court record.

"We expected 90 people at Harpers Ferry and had planned at first to have it catered. At the last minute we switched it to a potluck. It was a good thing because we had 180 people," said Kennedy.

Their reunions are more than pedigree charts and dry histories. Among the family members at the first national reunion was Dr. Les Allstott and his family Dixieland Band who entertained the group.

In 1994, 320 descendants gathered for their second national reunion in Corydon, Indiana.

Next year, the Oregon Allstotts will host the national reunion at the Pendleton Convention Center.

Mix this with Yellowstone National Park, Crater Lake National Park, Olympic National Park, North Cascades National Park, Dinosaur National Monument, and Glacier International Park to start.

Alma Says, "BOOS Are Not Just for

Halloween!" by Alma Alstott (Pg. 297) I want to tell you this little story which I thought was pretty interesting. Your Allstott book (Pg 145) states that Hans Martin Altstatt sold an acre of ground in Berks Co. PA for the Schwarzwald Lutheran Church in March 1753. And between 1781 and 1811 the pastor was a Rev. William Boos! (Pat Kennedy has a copy of the Church records where Rev. Boos married/baptized some Altstatts. ie., Adam Alstatt to Sara Gehr on 19 October 1794 and Sara Allstatt to Daniel Hoch on 26 July 1801). This perked my interest because my grandaughter Kendra (Judy's dau.) married William Boutell Boos in 1993. I thought - "could it be possible that there was a connection with the Allstatt and Boos line way back then??" SO - I have done quite a bit of searching on this Rev. Boos- he had a very interesting life but I do not believe that he is related to our Bill Boos.

On my last trip to the Salt Lake City History Research Library, I was able to trace my grandson Bill's line back to Germany: He goes back to a George Boos who was born in Dittelsheim, Hesse-Da rmstadt, Germany on 8 August 1846. His parents were Michael and Maria Christina (Schuppert) Boos. George came to America in 1855 at age eight. So, on my trip to SLC in April, I will try to find out who brought him over, hopefully the name of the ship, etc. Bill is so excited that I have found several generations of his family because he didn't know much about any of them. A very fascinating family. They did not settle in Penn. but went to Wisconsin and eventually to Minnesota where some of them are yet. Henry P. Boos, the son of George became a dentist, founded a dental laboratory.

I know that you can imagine me down in the German basement at SLC trying to read German and figure out what I was looking at. I also met a young German translator there who had a friend doing a thesis on the town of Dittelsheim by tracking the people who left there and learning where they went and what they did. He was glad to hear what I could tell him about the "BOOS" family and was going to pass it on to the other fellow. Do you know if Darmstadt is close to where the Allstadts originated? I'll have to study your book again. Isn't Genealogy fun???

Editor...Darmstadt is located around 10 miles from Dreieichenhain, the hometown of Martin Altstatt. Also, the land on which the Schwarzwald Church rests today is on part of the original Altstatt land purchased in 1734.
