I too am a strong believer in Divine Destiny. Charlie Otstot is the messenger who brought us together!

Absolutely, I'd be delighted to work with you on your Altstadt Family Tour. And you make it very easy with specific places you would like to visit on the family trip. The towns that you want to visit could be visited and at the same time interspersing visits to places like Heidelberg,

a 1 day or 1/2 day cruise up the Rhine, a visit to the Schwartzwald (Black Forest), etc.

I agree with you when you suggest that the trip be made inexpensively but with good hotels. I think it is a shame when people want to stay at Holiday Inns in Europe and thus miss the "German Experience". There are a lot of wonderful hotels and motels that are very comfortable yet relatively inexpensive. Last year our tour group stayed the first night along the Rhine in Rudesheim. We had dinner there. While we were eating a German gentleman dressed in liederhose played his accordion for us. It was a delightful touch. The next morning we WALKED about a block to the dock, and took the Rhine River Cruise. *It was delightful.*

It's nice to stay in one town for several days and take day trips. I'll look at your suggested "stops" and see if that can be arranged. We older folks enjoy NOT needing to pack and unpack so often. Such an arrangement, if it can be done, allows for a more leisurely trip.

I'll check the airlines and see if there are non-stop flights from Chicago. I am East Coast oriented so I have found that flights into and thus out of DC (Dulles Airport) makes it possible for ALL those coming from the west to fly into DC and then pick up a non-stop flight to Frankfurt where we'd begin our tour together. MY ancestors went to Berks Co in 1737 from near Karlsruhe (Spoeck). The Immigrant, Martin Pfattheicher (spelled 12 different ways in the first two generations) lived in the Tulpehocken Settlement. If by chance your Altstadts

Ewald Wuschke Tells of His Altstadt Heritage

The Von Altstadt name from the Allstedt Castle existed there for over two hundred years (1150-1350). That is at least seven generations. If the oldest son carried on the family fortune, the lesser sons would spread out throughout Europe. In these seven generations the name could be carried throughout Europe. It is like your Martin Altstatt family Your forefather was born in 1699 and came to America in 1729. That is a bit over 250 years and look how the family has spread out in the United States. You would have a similar effect when the Von Altstadt family was located in Halle and Wettin. Yes the Von Altstadt was part of the Wettin Clan.

In 1230 when the Teutonic Knights were given the task to convert the Prussen in Prussia they were given the right to the land that they conquered. This was the start of East and West Prussia. In the next 200 years they conquered not only the Prussias but the Baltic countries as well using soldiers from Germany and settling the conquered area with these soldiers if they came from good families and also brnging in German peasants where needed to farm the land.

Dennis Alstott fondly remembers the time he and his wife, Jeanne, watched their son Mike play his first football game.

"On the fourth or fifth play, he ran 70 yards for a touchdown," says Dennis, "but his helmet was so big, it turned sideways and he was looking through the earhole. I was running alongside him (down the sidelines), and my wife

the sidelines), and my wife was running alongside me." Nearly 17 years have

Nearly 17 years have passed since Mike played in that Pop Warner game in his hometown of Joliet, IL. A lot has changed for Alstott, now playing professionally with Tampa Bay and regarded as one of the best fullbacks in the NFL. But one thing hasn't. Every time he has stepped onto the field for a game, his father has been there. Jeanne has missed only one game, the annual spring game at Purdue University in

Mike's sophomore year, because of surgery. Between a 1992 Jeep Cherokee and a 1996

Ford pickup, the Alstotts, both 51, have logged thousands of miles to see their youngest son play. Dennis, who has worked at a Joliet environmental company for 10 years, says they've been fortunate not to encounter any problems getting to games.

The couple use their vacation days for the outings to Mike's games. They leave on Friday afternoons for Bucs' road games and Saturday mornings for home games, before returning home on Monday mornings.

When the Bucs' bus arrives at the hotel on the road, Dennis and Jeanne are there to greet Mike and his teammates.

"Everybody knows my parents," says Mike, who is sidelined with a hip injury.

"They've been there for me, and I play for them as well as my team and the fans." Says Dennis: "All the guys just call me 'Pops.' It has been a great experience for us, and the organization (Tampa Bay) has made us feel like family."

A trip to San Diego during Mike's rookie season in 1996 holds a special place for Dennis and Jeanne. They lived there over 30 years ago, when Dennis was in the Marines.

The Alstotts plan to move to Tampa after they retire in a couple of years to

spend more time with Mike, who makes his off-season home in St. Petersburg.

"It's great having them involved in everything that's happening in my life," says Mike. "After the game, no matter if things went good or bad, it's good to know they're there. At that point, nothing else really matters."

The Evilsizer researchers have proved that Jacob and John , were NOT Hessian Soldiers. It has been proven that they returned to Germany, married in Germany and died in Germany. The tale of five brothers was started by my father (god rest his soul) back in the 1960's and has since been proven not to be. Henry was a son of Jacob, there has been no proof of any Thomas, and

William is the son of an unknown brother to Jacob. The FIRST time Evilsizer appears is 1779 tax list in Berks Co, PA. We all know that the Hessians came in c.1776 but could not own land for 7 years, making it not possible for the Jacob EVELSHEIMER listed on the tax lists to be the Hessian soldier. This all was taking place at the same time as the Von Altstadt name was prominent in the Halle, Germany area. Why shouldn't then the younger Altstadt sons have taken part in this occupation of Prussia?

The marriage and death record of Michael Altstadt is very clear. It says he was born in PRUSSIA. There are two village names called Altstadt on the Prussian map just south of Marienburg. I have a hunch that they were given to a Von Altstadt for his services in Prussia and that these places then connect with my family Johann Jakob and his son Michael Altstadt(1785) who were born in PRUSSIA.

In the documents from 900 - 1200 which were written in Latin we have the following spellings: "villicus de Altstede", "Altsteti", "in corte que Altstet dicitur". In the latin the "t" in Alt is always there. Around 1500-1600 in many casesthe Latin "e" was changed to the German "ä" Thus in middle German (Frankish) the name was written Allstädt or Altstädt and in Prussia the """ umlaut was dropped and you had Altstadt.

Anyway the main correction is that the Altstadt's arrived in Congress Poland ca.1795 from Prussia.

We are trying to update the family histories in our branches. What we have is 25 to 50 years old and has to be brought up to date. We have several persons now working on this.

This article came from a posting by a Bessie Rowland. I am forwarding her two e-mails so that you can see what she had to say. The information definitely came verbally to her.

Rachel Kerns (Carnes) married Joseph Stutsman about 1793 in N.C. one son Daniel born in 1794. Joseph Stutsman died and Rachel was appointed administrator in Clark Co., IN, in 1802. She married second John Covert on September 9, 1802, one month after Joseph's death. They had two daughters who married Alstotts. Nancy married William and her sister Mary married Thomas Oct 15 1826. Mary married George Ivy after the death of Thomas.

Elizabeth Covert daughter of John and Rachel married John Edward Warner on November 17, 1831, in Clark Co., IN. Her brother, John Bates Covert, married John Edward's sister Hester Ann Warner on August 1, 1833. John Bates went with John Charles Fremont on one of his trips to California He was an expert rifleman and helped protect the party on his travels to explore the western states.

He liked what he saw and persuaded all who would go to make the trip. Rachel was living with Henry K. so she spent the rest of her life in the home of her daughter Elizabeth Warner. Lucas or Luke did not make the trip and died in the civil war. Most of the Coverts living in Arkansas are descended from Luke.

Among the ones going to California was two Davis Boys one the husband of Indiana Alstott who lost her life in southern Utah during the raid on the livestock. John Bates skill with the rifle accounted for a part of the raiding party. Indiana and Lucinda were buried on the trail.

I'm tracing all the possibilities in going back to the roots of our Altstadt/Alstadt/ Allstadt lines in Germany and looking forward to our meeting next year.

We can cluster the whole (Altstadt) list in five groups:

1. Originally from central Hesse: Burghaun (Clausmarbach), Schwalmstadt, Schlitz, Haunetal, Hünfeld, Bad Hersfeld

=> *1659, Reinhard Altstadt (or Altenstadt) in Clausmarbach

=> ca. 1400 Herr v. Altenstadt (Marburg/Rauschenberg)!!!;

2. Originally from Michelfeld Area: Angelbachtal, Badenweiler, Müllheim, Erlangen, Gelsenkirchen, Bad Salzungen, Kraichgau, Heilbronn, Mühlhausen, Kenzingen, Bad Schönborn

=> • 1756, Georg (Reinhard?) Altstadt in Michelfeld

3. Originally from Frankfurt Area: Frankfurt, Dreieich, Hanau, Ulm, Neu-Isenburg, Oberursel

=> • 1673, Johann Caspar Altstadt in Hain/Dreieichenhain

=> • 1637, first Altstadt was born in the Lutheran Church of Darmstadt

4. Originally from Westphalia: Dortmund, Hagen, Essen, Dormagen, Mühlheim, Halle, Witten, Castrop-Rauxel

=> • 1588, Johannn Heinrich Alsted (Altstetten) in Ballersbach

=> • 1145, Dietrich II v. Altstätten

You see the different spellings; in the northern and northwestern part of Germany they used the ending ...stedt, ...städt ...stede or stedius (latin) and in the southern and eastern part they used ...stadt or stadius.

I addressed some 'key'-person and 'Pfarrämter (Evangelical church)' of each group but up to now without any reply. I have the presumption, that we can link group 1 to 2, group 3 to 4.

INDIAN WAR OF 1812 BATTLE OF HORSESHOE BEND

In March, 1814, General Andrew Jackson mobilized the Tennessee Militia, made up of Volunteers from the East and West Tennessee Militia and the Thirty-Ninth U.S. Infantry for a full-scale campaign against the Red Sticks Indian Tribe. General Jackson's army totaled about 3,000 men. Jackson's army left Fort Williams on the Coosa River (Mississippi Territory) and marched 52 miles through the forest in three days. The made camp six miles north of Horseshoe Bend. The Red Stick's had built a barricade on the river, which eventually trapped them once Jackson's soldiers surrounded them. Over 800 Red Sticks died as a result of the battle. General Jackson's dead and wounded were taken back to Fort Williams. The following is a listing of the soldiers who were buried at Fort Williams.

The original site of Fort Williams is now under Lay Lake in Coosa County, Alabama. The headstones and the monument to the soldiers were moved to a new location 57 miles north of Horseshoe Bend Military Park. The cemetery has been badly vandalized. The site is NOT part of the Military Park and is on private property. Unfortunately, the cemetery cannot be maintained by the Military Park Rangers as they have no jurisdiction over the site.

The following list of those buried at the Indian War of 1812 Cemetery. There is a corresponding map. The list and map were done in March 1978 by Mr. Paul Ghioto, Park Historian, Horseshoe Bend Military Park. The headstones are numbered 1 through 78.

78. Alstadt, Nicholas, Pvt (pg. 177)

Location of the Cemetery: The Cemetery is near the town of Sylacuaga, Ala., about 13.2 miles off of U.S. Highway 280, approximately 57 North of Horseshoe Bend Military Park. The Site is marked on Alabama Maps as "Indian War of 1812 Cemetery."

Nicholas Alstadt was a son of John Altstatt, 1755, and was the first Altstatt/Alstott to have ever died in service to his country.
