
We started on Friday night at the Super 8 and the lobby was quite over crowded. But who cared, we were having a great time catching up on five years of gabbing.

"The national reunion is held at a different location every five years," said Alsat.
"The first was at Harper's Ferry, West Virginia in 1989. The second was at Corydon, Indiana in 1994 and the third in Pendleton, Oregon in 1999."

Alstat says the first recorded arrival of any members of the family to America was in 1729. Included in the family records is of one member who was with General George Washington on his Christmas Eve crossing of the Delaware River during the War of Independence.





The 5th National Allstadt/Altstadt Reunion

The reunion will be in August 2009 during Germanfest in Evansville, Indiana, at a date still yet undetermined...follow future newsletters for exact dates!

Europe Spring 2007...YES! We had a great time in 2003 visiting our immigrant ancestors home towns - - now we go back further into the past to the origins of our clans in Belgium, Germany and Switzerland while enjoying Spring tulips in Holland along the way!

The 2003 Germany Tour centered around the Allstadt/Altstadt immigrant ancestors who came to America. The 2007 Tour will look more into the ancient roots of the Allstadt/Altstadt clans. We will be traveling in the footsteps of the ancient "holy-place" **Alahstads** as they journeyed from the Baltic coast into Hessen - - and up from the Swiss areas around Lake Constance into the Baden/Michelfeld

I know you will enjoy the tour! We will be starting out in Switzerland and ending in Switzerland - - possibly flying into and out of Zurich from Dulles Airport, Washington, DC.

Here is the proposed itinerary:

Days 1/2 - Fly from Dulles into Zurich. Meet Elisabeth Lutz, our tour guide, and drive to the area of Altstetten, Switzerland (west of Zurich) for the evening stay and a look around the town. Elisabeth

will be *pre*researching this town for us to see where their Altstetten "roots" are found.

Day 3 - Motor from Altstetten, Switzerland, across the Rhine River at Basel into the Black Forest of Germany. At Freiburg we continue north stopping at the **Freilictmuseum** (my Michelin tour book says it takes two hours to tour). Continuing northwest to Offenburg we turn north to Michelfeld. We spend the night at Michelfeld, to "run" us around again possibly at the Engel...and

eat dinner with Michelfeld Altstadts/Wiegels at the *Engel*.

Day 4 - Leave Michelfeld and turn north to Heidelberg for a Castle/Altstadt tour then lunch at the Altstadt. We continue north to Heppenheim for a coffee (or Italian eis) break and continue north to Darmstadt for a tour of the Prinz-Georg-Garten/Palais. Evening in Darmstadt.

Day 5 - Leave Darmstadt for Dreieichenhain with morning tour and lunch at Dreieiechenhain. After lunch we motor to Gambach (early Altstadt site) and drive east to Burghaun for the evening meal and overnight at the Burghanerhof (same place where we had one of our banquets in 2003). We will invite the local Altstadts to eat with us here We will again visit Allstedt Castle.



as we did in 2003.

Day 6 - Leave Burghaun and head northeast to Altenstadt and Paderborn for morning tour and

lunch. After lunch we head west to Dortmund and, heading west, we cross from Germany into Belgium and our overnight stop near Antwerp, Belgium.

Day 7 - Leave the Antwerp area for Brugge (early Altstadt site) for the City Tour and lunch. After lunch we retrace our route to Antwerp and head north into Holland and eastward to our evening destination of Arnhem. We will take some time to stop

and see tulip fields and windmills (the old *fashioned type*) as we tour through Holland.

Day 8 - Leave Arnhem, Holland, for Alstätte,



Germany, (early Altstadt site) on the western border of Holland with and Germany. Next we head to our evening stay at Bremen. Jöerg Allstädt -- (who met us at Allstedt Schloss in 2003) will welcome us in Bremen.

Day 9 - Leave Bremen and head toward Lübeck (early Altstadt site) with a coffee break near Hamburg on the way to Lübeck. City tour and lunch at Lübeck. Leave Lübeck in the afternoon and turn south to Hannover and head to Helmstedt for the evening.

Day 10 - Leave Helmstedt and turn south to Eisleben. At Eisleben tour Martin Luther birthplace the in morning. Continue south for lunch at Ouerfurt. After lunch head west to Allstedt Schloss for an afternoon

> tour of the castle. After the tour drive south to Dornburg (early *Altstadt site*). After a short break we turn west to Erfurt for the evening meal andlodging.

> Day 11 - Leave Erfurt and continue south to Coburg (early Altstadt site). There we have a city tour in the morning and lunch. After lunch, we motor south to Bamberg. We will meet Tobi Allstadt, who now lives in Bamberg, and he will guide us around the city. Later that afternoon we continue to Erlangen. We have dinner at the "Brave Bavarian." We

will stay at the same hotel as in 2003...a block and a half from the restaurant. Hermann and Gundi Altstadt and other Allstadts/Altstadts from the area will join us.

Day 12 - Leave Erlangen for morning tour of the Nürnberg castle and castle museum. Then stroll the town and have lunch. Then we head south for München (Munich). We have a brief tour of München and spend the evening there.

Day 13 - Leave München and head to Fussen and further south to 'das wunderbar' Schloss Neuschwanstein. We tour the Schloss and have lunch then return to Fussen and head to Lindau near the Bodensee. Evening dinner and stay at Lindau.

Day 14 - From Lindau we take the ferry to Rorschach, Switzerland, across the Bodensee (*Lake Constance*). Then we drive south to Altstätten. Tour of Altstätten. Day in Altstätten at leisure.

Day 15 - Altstätten to St. Gallen. Morning for shopping in St. Gallen...on to Zurich for shopping, rest and evening final dinner.

Day 16 - Pack up our souvenirs and memories and return to the good ol' USA.

Old Alstadt Home found in Berks County, PA

In June 2004, Phyllis and I stopped by to visit the Daniel Boone Homestead in Birdsboro, PA. The Homestead is located in Berks County only around 5 miles from the original **Martin Altstatt** (1699) farm. The tour guide was a fellow named Jim Lewars, who is the administrator of the Homestead. After the tour, I talked to Jim and told him about my Berks County Altstatt roots and that the old Schwarzwald Church was located on the **Martin Altstatt** property. He said that he attended the Schwarzwald Church and then he asked me if I had seen the old Alstadt house. I didn't know that one existed - so later, after we returned to California, he e-mailed me the location of the house. That house will be on our itinerary next fall. I do not know if this was a house owned by **Adam Alstadt**, a son of **Martin Altstatt**, but I sure hope Jim can find out.

In Jim's e-mail he said, "I have been extremely busy in October and I apologize for not getting back to you sooner. The Alstadt House is a privately owned residence located on Rt. 562 near Jacksonwald in Exeter Township, Berks County. The house is not visible from the road and I am not sure if the present owners are amenable to visitors. If you are familiar with this area, there is a development called 'Farming Ridge' located along Rt. 562. The private drive to the Alstadt House is located about 100 yards east of the Farming Ridge entrance, on the same side of Rt. 562. The house is a two-story limestone house, built in two sections. The present owner is a Dr. Lutz. I will try to obtain a phone number for him." Cordially, Jim Lewars, Administrator, Daniel Boone Homestead.

If you have not visited the Daniel Boone Homestead, it should be on your list of things to do. The tour was very encompassing...and on the property is the original house of Pierre Bertolet, the brother of John Bertolet, who married **Susanna Alstadt**, the daughter of **Nicholas Alstott**. This early original Bertolet building was probably of the same log construction as that of the original **Martin Altstatt** home.

Biergartens are from 300 to 500m within my surroundings.

One was a heart murmur and he's had the appointment with the heart specialist and treadmill with pictures of the heart with dye already. He also had the echocardiogram, which showed a problem with a valve. They believe medication will take care of it, thank God! The other thing was to do with the prostate. He went to Dr. Medley (the urologist we nearly know on a first name basis by now) and had to have a biopsy. His blood work didn't show cancer, but they wanted to make sure. Well, it's a good thing they did! It IS cancer! Now I never did like that word or disease, but I'm here to tell vou I HATE that word even worse now! He has to have a cat scan this Thursday and has an appt. to be 'microwaved' in a couple of weeks. (*That's* what Dr. Medley called the radiation.) They only aim to do that once, to reduce the swelling. They will then do the seed implant to kill it the rest of the way. It's so early, they don't believe there will be any
