
for, but also found that the July 4th weekend was still open. So the group voted to reserve the July 4th weekend for the national event.

As no Altstadt link has been found prior to the mid-1650s, no link to royalty is inferred. So the above names were either taken from towns or areas of Altstadt influence, thus the crests of these towns/area are shown. Heinricus Alstedius If any link is ever made to a royal line, you will be first to know!

Alstott out for season; won't speculate on future

TAMPA, Fla. -- Mike Alstott's season, and perhaps his career, is over.

The Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Thursday placed the six-time Pro Bowl fullback on injured reserve with a neck problem. Alstott said it is not related to a career-threatening injury that required surgery in 2003.

"It is what it is. The facts are the facts. I can't put on the helmet and jersey this year," the 33-year-old Alstott, flanked by Bucs general manager Bruce Allen, said during an emotional news conference at the team's headquarters.

"One thing is, you don't mess with the neck. There are always situations where it can be worsened by playing. It is a severe injury and it's a situation you don't mess with," he said.

But Alstott, arguably the most popular player in team history, couldn't bring himself to say that he may have played his last game. Several reports earlier Thursday from Tampa Bay-area media outlets indicated Alstott might hang it up, but he shrugged off several retirement-related questions, saying that's something that will be answered in time.

The team's second all-time rusher with 5,088 yards had been preparing for his 12th season but became concerned when soreness in his neck persisted as training camp progressed at Disney World.

Tests performed by team doctors revealed a new problem, and the decision to place him on IR was made after Alstott consulted with his personal surgeon, who operated on the fullback during the 2003 season.

"I just want to tell everyone I was ready to play football this year. My mind was set: 'I'm playing this game and I'm helping this team.' It's not like I went out there and the body wasn't working," Alstott said.

Alstott is the club's career leader in touchdowns (71) and TDs rushing (58). He was selected to appear in six straight Pro Bowls from 1997 to 2002.

"It's quite emotional because the man loves football, period," Allen said in the locker room."

FR. DAMIAN DIETLEIN, O.S.B.

50 Years Ordained

Fr. Damian (Leo) Dietlein O.S.B., (pg. 112) is from Braddock, ND, being born June 16, 1932, to Peter and Regina (Heembrock) Dietlein. He completed high school at the Abbey High School, and then went to St. John's University, Collegeville, MN, for two years. In 1951 he entered the novitiate at Assumption Abbey. After his novitiate year he completed his seminary studies at St. John's and then at Sant' Anselmo, Rome, and was ordained on July 25, 1957.

But ordination did not complete his educational endeavors. He returned to Rome where he completed a Licentiate in theology (STL) in 1959. After that he began Scripture studies at the Biblicum in Rome. He received a Licentiate in Sacred Scripture (SSL) in June, 1961.

After completing these two degrees, Fr. Damian was prepared to teach in our seminary. From the fall of 1961 to the spring of 1967, when our seminary closed, he taught Scripture and Dogmatic Theology. During the summers of 1964 and 1965 he taught Scripture to the Sisters at St. Teresa's

College, Winona, MN, and during the summer of 1966 he studied German at Marylhurst College in Oregon.

When our seminary closed in 1967, he was appointed prior of the monastery and taught in our school. But considering his talents and education it was thought that his talents could be used better in a seminary. So in the fall of 1968 he traveled to southern Indiana and began teaching Scripture at St. Meinrad School of Theology, St. Meinrad, IN. He has been there ever since.

After forty years of teaching Scripture at St. Meinrad, Fr. Damian is regarded as "the grand old man" of the faculty. Not only is he the senior member, he is considered one of those unifying figures who help bind together the whole school, faculty and students. Fr. Damian has long served as the advisor to the visiting monks in the St. Meinrad Seminary, which currently includes our Bro. Anthony Baker.

Fr. Damian has had the opportunity to enjoy a number of sabbaticals that have kept him current with Scriptural and theological developments. He is especially interested in feminist theology. His return to Assumption Abbey each summer has enabled him to maintain strong ties with his fellow monks. He helps out at work needing to be done,

especially baling the hay for our ranch and doing pastoral work on weekends.

Fr. Damian is someone who shows how to be an active and involved monk while spending most of his time away from the monastery.

June 2007: research in German records draws a big zero!

Researcher Heinz Hang set us up an appointment at the Hanau genealogical library where we spent quite a few hours

looking over microfilm records. Nothing popped up on Altstadt's at all. That was a real "crush."

The next day we ran up to Ravolzhausen to check church records and found that the church there had been built AFTER Caspar Altstadt was born. The church was built around 1680. The librarian there directed us to where the area

records were kept in Langenselbold, but the librarian was on holiday. So we gave up on Caspar Altstadt research for this year.

Next we traveled down to the Allsfätter (Alstat, pg. 40) region east of Darmstadt to Messbach to look in their church records. The church cemetery at Messback is unique as it is the only cemetery in Germany that still uses wooden grave markers. The church clerk at Messback told us that all their records had been moved to the church library in Eschau.

Hermann Altstadt and I had high hopes of digging back in time for both the Caspar Altstadt and Rhinehart Alstat clans this year. So we were off again for the 40-minute drive to the Kleiner Kirchenführer in Eschau. This time the librarian was home, *BUT* the library was undergoing restoration, and getting to view early church books with any Allstätter record was impossible.

So, we will have to reschedule to another year...probably our next Europe visit in 2010!
