Some ancient Altstadt research by one of our Canadian cuzzins...

#### My Altstadt Family Folklore by Elvira Wuschke Howe

Altenstädt and Allstedt were called "Alahstadt" in old high German by Ulfilas (c.?311–383) he was a Goth of Cappadocian Greek descent who served as a bishop and missionary, translated the Bible, and participated in the Arian religious controversy. Alahstat can mean a heathen temple but also a hallowed place of justice, a house of the king, a royal residence which was regarded as consecrated or set apart for the lord. Which is the meaning Ulfilas probably meant.

Across continental Europe the landscape is peppered with ancient hillforts. Though these hillforts first came to be when groups of people, including the Celts, banded together during the Urnfield period to fortify themselves against war and attacks, they eventually changed from protecting people to protecting commodities. As trade between tribes spread and local economies flourished, a rich elite class began to emerge. This new elite class quickly rose to power within their regions and the hillforts transitioned from communal estates to private estates owned by the dominate families. Many of these estates started to be given names, and many of them were named *Altstadt*, or something of similar spelling depending on the regional dialect. The word *altstadt* has its origins in the Celtic languages. In Brythonic Gaelic, the word "allt" means "hill" and the word "stadt" means "estate." As a result, it is logical to assume that these were, in fact, the original names of these hillfort estates. As the Celts spanned across most of Lerived from the Celtic word "hallt," which means "salt," which could indicate that

estates. As the Celts spanned across most of Europe from Finland, Sweden and Norway down through Germany, France and Portugal, castles and towns by the name of "Altstadt" (or a variation of the name) can be found in most of these countries.

of these countries.
As the elite families became more affluent, they used these fortified hill estates to protect their riches; such as, iron, gold,

to protect their riches; such as, iron, gold, During the Bronze Age, salt became one of the most significant trade products of the era to the point where an entire culture developed from it. The Hallstatt culture, predominately Celtic in central and western Europe, is named after the town of Hallstatt, Austria, which is located beside one of the oldest and largest salt mines in Europe. The word Hallstatt finds its origins in the Greek word "hals" meaning "salt" and the Celtic word "statt" meaning town, so it literally translates to "salt town." As salt was traded further outside of Austria, the language and culture also spread. The Hallstatt culture spread into Germany as salt deposits were discovered and excavated as far north as Lübeck and as far west as Hessen. This is evident at the location of one of the oldest and largest salt mines found near Halle on the Saale, where the town name of "Halle" is derived from the Celtic word "hallt," which means "salt," which could indicate that the Celtic people assimilated language from as far as the Greek Empire while travelling for trade during the Bronze Age.

Note: by Elvira...When checking the histories of various large old cities in Hessen they each mentioned the Celtic beginnings of their city. However there does not seem to be anyone who has gathered the scattered Celtic history into a historical book or article. Since 1950 there have been a couple of major finds of massive Celtic settlements and that is now being documented and written about.

In my Altstadt Family there is a folk lore that we were "aristocratic vons" (once upon a time) so I have been interested as to where we could have come from as that is unknown still to this day. I have been studying various "von" Altstadt / Alstadt names for many years, in the old days it could have been spelled many ways, now though Alt is used as a town name as in "Alt" stadt (old town or old city center) and "Als" tadt as the aristocrats use to differenciate themselves since the 16th century. I have also discovered that the

#### Quarterback Griffin Alstott has made his move to Western Michigan official

**Griffin Alstott** has changed his Twitter handle to "Quarterback at Western Michigan University."

The Purdue Rivals site (goldandblack.com) first reported Alstott's impending transfer earlier this spring. His leaving isn't a surprise when you look at the current quarterback depth chart and the arrival of Jack Plummer in the spring to Purdue.

Purdue coach Jeff Brohm will likely add another quarterback in the 2019 recruiting class, whether it's Clemson transfer Hunter Johnson from Brownsburg or one from the high school ranks. In fact, the Boilermakers are hosting a quarterback on an official visit this weekend - Paul Piferi from Villa Park in California. That's the same high school Nick Sipe attended.

Alstott isn't listed on WMU's roster yet but will probably show up when summer school starts. Alstott still remains on Purdue's roster - along



with another player who wears No. 5, safety T.J. Jallow - who won't return next season (academics).

The program is slow to update its roster - too slow in my opinion. Don't look for a new roster until right before



training camp, based on how last summer played out.

# Kaneland senior RB goes for 217 yards in 50-14 win over Morris

PARK, IL – Big plays in the first half Friday put Kaneland in control. The Knights scored on seven of their first eight possessions

and rolled past Morris 50-14 in Northern Big 12 play Friday night at Petersen Field. The victory puts the Knights at 6-2 overall and 3-1 in the conference.

Senior running back **Jonathan Alstott** rushed for 93 yards in the first half and finished with 217 yards and two touchdowns. "People really stepped it up tonight on the line, and that made a difference," said Alstott, a four-year starter. Alstott's 1-yard scamper moments after his 54-yard run gave the Knights an early 7-0 lead with 9:34 left in the first quarter.

"I think this senior class would like to go

out with a special year and I think we've done a good job of preparing for it. We've got some good talent coming up, too." While he'd like to go out with a bang, Alstott — entering his fourth season as a starter — is looking forward to the next level. "A lot of schools want to see how his senior year goes," Kaneland coach Pat Ryan said. "He's improved tremendously. He has a good pedigree. His father and the dad of former Joliet Catholic, Purdue and Tampa Bay Buccaneer running back Mike Alstott are cousins.

Kaneland has been to the playoffs twice in Alstott's three years on varsity, going 7-4, 4-5 and 7-4. Alstott rushed for 541 yards and six touchdowns and caught 17 passes for 159 yards and another TD his freshman year. He rushed for 582 and 762 yards in succeeding seasons, giving him a career total of 1,885 yards. He averages 5.1 yards per carry and has 21 career TDs. He's been the team leader in carries for his career but is hardly a workhorse in the Knights' spread offense.

At 5-foot-9, Alstott is not the biggest guy.
And to prepare for this coming season, he got even smaller. "I lost 15 pounds this offseason and am down to 190," "I've improved my speed. I might not have 30 carries a game, but that's OK, as long as I make the most of the



aristocratic "von people" could use the name of any town that they owned or married into. That law has been changed recently as well.

Since about 1600, only aristocratic families were allowed to use the "von" prefix in Germany. So if someone was a baron of a village, his family name would be "von" and the village name. In older names, though, "von" sometimes merely indicated that a person was from an area: Lukas von Albrecht may have been Lukas from Albrecht. German immigrants to North America who used the "von" prefix almost never had used it previously in their native

And so I will probably never know if I am a Aristocratic von or just a person who comes from an Altstadt town somewhere.

Some old and new interesting finds so far.

- 1. Amalia von Altstadt from the Hesse Solms-Braunfel family became the Queen of the Netherlands. I found where she used the Alstadt name in her travels and her brother as well. However due to the sands of time that info is no longer on the internet. (See information
- 2. In 1674 Duke Bernhard II of Saxe-Jena used the Alstädt name when he had a daughter by Marie Elisabeth von Kospoth. Daughter was named Emilie Eleonore von Kospoth, legitimized in 1676 as Countess von Alstädt and given a crest that only her family could use. She married Otto Wilhelm von Tumpling. Their descendants kept the name von Alstädt.
- 3. Recently I found a Wilhelm Moritz von Altstadt who married Elisabeth Juliane Augusta von Carnitz from Dresdan in Stargard, Prussia (now in Poland) His actual name turns out Isenburg, he was a Dutch General serving in Prussia at the time. They moved to Maastrict, Netherlands and died there. ( Elvira has the documents for that saved.)

The Solms family from Hessen intermarried with many famous families in Germany and other countries and is one of the largest von families in Germany I think. \*Story Of Amalia of Solms-Braunfels who became Queen of Holland/Netherlands

Amalia of Solms-Braunfels spent her childhood at the parental castle at Braunfels. She became one of the personal assistants of Elizabeth, wife of Frederick V, Elector Palatine, the "Winter King" of Bohemia.

After imperial forces defeated Frederick

V, she fled with the pregnant queen to the west. Shelter was denied to them because the emperor forbade it. Elizabeth went into labour during their flight and Amalia helped her with her

The end of their journey was The Hague, where stadtholder Maurice von Nassau, cousin of the elector gave them asylum in 1621. They often appeared at his court, where Maurice's younger half-brother Frederick Henry became infatuated with Amalia in 1622. She refused to become his lover and held out for marriage.

When Maurice von Nassau died, he made

Henrich Altstett (Altstetten) came as a soldier to Treysa, Hessen and married Anna Martha, she was a soap boiler.

Georg Bernhard Altstadt was a strumpfstricker or stocking maker (knitter) who lived in Michelfeld, Baden. He married Margaretha Groß, (Gross) on February 22, 1756.

Bernhardt's son, Johann (Bernhard) Altstadt was a town bürger and a bäckermeister (master baker). Thus a line of master bakers was born. Bernhard's son Heinrich Altstadt, also a baker,

fathered the US line of Altstadts (pg. 84).

This Altstadt line is one of three\* known descendant lines living in Germany and the United States. ((\* Georg Bernhard Altstadt (Michelfeld-Erlangen, Germany) US line immigrated to New York in 1850s-70s...then later...Nebraska area; Johann Georg Altstadt (Allstadt) (Grossenbach-Cambria, PA-Munich, Germany) US lines immigrated to Pennsylvania in 1851...then later... Minnesota; **Johann Martin Altstatt** (Altstadt) (*Dreieichenhain-Freinsheim-Hamburg*, Germany-Sweden) line immigrated to PA in 1729...then spread westward after the Revolutionary War.))

his half-brother Frederick Henry promise to wed

Frederick married Amalia on 4 April 1625. Their marriage produced five children who lived to adulthood, and four who died young:

• Stadtholder William II (1626–1650), married Mary of England Note: Amalia was the prime mover of several royal marriages, including that of her son William II to Mary, Princess Royal of England and Scotland (daughter of KingCharles I of England and their son established the Hanover-Stewart line of England.

• Luise Henriette of Nassau (1627–1667), married Frederick William, Elector of

Brandenburg

 Albertine Agnes of Nassau (1634–1696), married William Frederick, Count of Nassau-Dietz

• Henriette Catherine of Nassau (1637–1708), married John George II, Prince of Anhalt-Dessau

• Maria of Nassau (1642–1688), married Louis Henry Maurice, son of Louis Philip of Palatine-Simmern-Kaiserslautern.

Amalia had a large influence upon policy; she acted as the political advisor of Frederick, and after he became sick in 1640, she openly participated in politics and received foreign diplomats. Her influence is regarded to have contributed to the Peace of Westphalia in 1648. As a recognition, King Philip IV of Spain granted her the area around Turnhout in 1649.

All in all having a name like Altstadt/Altenstadt/Altenberg etc can be very hard to trace back to one particular family but if you are an Altstadt of any various spelling....you too may be related to a "von" family
