Professor Alison Altstatt has a love for ancient research

"Re-membering the Wilton Processional: A Manuscript Lost and Found."



University of Northern Iowa, presented her paper entitled "Re-membering the Wilton"

Processional: A Manuscript Lost and Found."

Her research began with one of the manuscript leaves held in The University of Iowa Libraries, Special Collections! Altstatt recognized the leaf as "familiar." Indeed, she found that it was identical to the transcription of the Wilton Processional (13th/14th century) carried out by the monks at the Abbey of Solesmes in the late 1850s. By 1860 however, all trace of the original had disappeared!

Professor Altstatt has re-found it and since traced another 33 leaves across the country.

She discussed how this manuscript, which had once been whole,

had been dismembered and sold off as individual leaves by the book dealer Phillip Duschnes and selfproclaimed bibliophile Oto

Altstatt's findings carry implications for musicologists as well as historians of the book. But most importantly perhaps, she calls for more interdisciplinary work and the convergence of digital databases that catalogue texts and those that catalogue musical notation such as CAŇTUS.

Associate Professor of Musicology/Music History Alison Altstatt is a historian of

medieval chant. Her research has focused on the music and ritual of Benedictine convents, the genres of sequence and proper office, and medieval manuscripts and their twentieth-century reception. She has presented her work to the American Musicological Society, the Cantus Planus study group of the International Musicological Society, the College Music Society, the International Congress on Medieval Studies, the Medieval Academy of America, the North American Academy of Liturgy, and the Working Group

"Honestly, I was pretty nervous at first about taking the head coaching job," Alstott said. "I've been coaching these senior girls since they were in fifth grade in volleyball and basketball, so we have a strong connection. But it's still different being the head coach compared to the assistant.

The girls were very thankful and

Honestly, I didn't know that and it made me feel more comfortable about it." Senior Alyxis Mericle returns after posting 33 kills last year. Classmates Kierstin Clark, **Emma Alstott**, Mya McClain, Alyson Nieland, Aleah Anderson and Clare Conrad join her to provide leadership and experience.

"The girls have been working hard," Alstott said. "We were able to have Ankeny head coach Dave Whims come down and run a camp that really helped get our offseason started. Since, we have been putting in the work to get better, learn what the strengths of each player is and put them in a position to be at their best."

Clark recorded 24 kills, Alstott 16 and McClain three. Mericle had 12 blocks, Anderson five and Clark three, with McClain recording 25 aces and serving at 98-percent.

with Anderson and Mericle each picking up two.

The Gaels open their season Thursday at Greene County before hosting the St. Edmond Invitational on Saturday with Webster City, Southeast Valley, Bishop Garrigan, Pocahontas Area and Aplington-Parkersburg all set to be in attendance.

FLOYDS KNOBS — Floyd Central senior **Gavinn Alstott** will make his third trip to the IHSAA State Finals today at Bankers Life Fieldhouse in Indianapolis. Alstott, who boasts a career record of 142-13, will face Wawasee senior Jace Alexander in his first-round match.

"My goal is, I've wrote it down in my phone every year, it's win that state championship," Alstott said. Dreams of a state title began many years ago for Alstott, whose uncle Craig was a four-time state qualifier for Floyd back in the 1980s. "I started when I was 8 years old and I think part of it was I heard my uncle had wrestled. Then I got a flier (about wrestling) and I was like, 'I'm going to try this. This looks really cool,'" Alstott remembered. "I didn't really know what it was. I didn't know all the responsibilities and how it was going to end up, but my grandpa (Ronnie), he kind of helped me stick with it. He was like, 'You're really good, you shouldn't quit.' when it was hard, but I stuck through it and I'm grateful that I did. **Gavinn Alstott** competed in the Evansville Semistate as a sophomore. After qualifying for the IHSAA State Finals as a freshman and sophomore, he missed the event last year after losing in the

semistate. He returns to the State Finals, and Bankers Life Fieldhouse today.

Hermann Altstadt Sez...

Records find Stephan Altstadt of Burghaun, Germany in the 1500s! Earliest Altstadt on file in the Area

The early Altstadt/Altenstadt/Allenstadt families settled around 1600 and early 17th century in the areas of Schlitz, Hünfeld, Hersfeld with Kalkobes and Allmershausen, Raboldshausen, Marburg and Alsfeld and not to forget Burghaun!!!

In the Burghaun area, for example, in the year 1582, a **Stephan Altstadt** was sentenced to pay 20 Gulden (about 200 euros) in a court on March, 16th, 1582. I found this information in a book about the City of Burghaun and surroundings.

The reason...Stephan impregnated Matthias Gass' widow ahead of time; which means he did not wait a certain amount time after she became a widow. Stephan must have been born around 1560 - one of the earliest Altstadt in the region we know up to now. Between 1582 and 1625...what??? She has also given numerous invited workshops on the performance of medieval chant. In May 2018, she was the H.P. Krause Visiting Research Fellow at Yale University's Beinecke Rare Book and Manuscript Library, where she conducted research on English medieval liturgical music manuscripts in the Otto F. Ege collection.


United States Census Records now easier to view on the internet





Burkhard Altstadt, the Tiefenorter in Gelsenkirchen, Germany, has died. After a sérious illness, Burkhard started the

June 20, 1934 - July 11,

last journey at the age of 87. Friends mourn in Gelsenkirchen, where the family has lived since 1952 where he worked as a master shoemaker,

in the footsteps of his ancestor **Jakob Altstadt** in the fourth generation. He embellished his profession with collections of tools and shoes of different times and styles, which can be seen in the *Tiefenort History Museum*.

Burkhard was born in Tiefenort, Germany, and it has never left his heart. Visits to the village on the Werra River, to see relatives and friends... to Krayenburg and Wacht were regularly done, as well as home meetings with former Tiefenorters on the west side of the inner-German (East German) border.

Burkhard felt it was very lucky when the former border opened in 1989, and the trip to the East on the legendary "Christmas goose" could be done.

Burkhard was always available with his knowledge and memories; his generosity flowed into donations in kind and money. The Heimatund Kulturverein and the Krayenburg community honored him with honorary memberships.

Burkhard took part in the life of Tiefenort, for example with his proposal, accepted by the local council, to name streets after Max Sauerbrey and Carl Schanz, who were important in the history of Tiefenort and Krayenburg. The sculpture "Jacobs Platz" was finished at that time. The sculpture is reminiscent of Jakob Altstadt, who founded the family's Tiefenort line.

A project that Burkhardt began months ago now extends beyond his death. He gave Max Sauerbrey a treasure trove of publications, documents, correspondence and notes of the estate of his ancesfor Louis Altstadt which will be gradually transferred to Tiefenort, his place of birth and longing. Tiefenort, where he found his final resting place, will remember **Burkhard Altstadt** as if he were sitting on "Jacobs Platz" as it was when it was inaugurated. Editor's note: Burkhardt, "der shuhmeister," was a good friend who will be missed. Hermann Altstadt and I visited his home and saw the Tievenort museum on one of our genealogy get-togethers. Burkhardt attended one of the dinners during the 2003 American AAA tour in Burghaun and joined us at other times when I was in Germany.

National Register of Historic Places: Harpers Ferry National Historical Park Allstadt Farm Cultural Landscape National Park Service

The farm played a role in the 1862 Battle of Harpers Ferry during the Civil War.

The Allstadt Farm, approximately two miles southwest of the town of Harpers Ferry, was once a prosperous farmstead, initially farmed by tenants and eventually owned by Pennsylvania Germans who had migrated to the area in the early 1800s. It is also significant for its association with *John Brown's Raid* on Harpers Ferry, the Civil War Battle of Harpers Ferry, and the industrial history of the area during the first half of the 1900s.

In addition to his agricultural operation, **Jacob Allstadt** operated a tavern in his dwelling. Although it is unknown how brisk a business the tavern did, an inventory of his estate at the time of his death (1821) suggests he was a successful farmer.

Harpers Ferry National Monument was established in 1944 and re-designated Harpers Ferry National Historical Park in 1963. The Allstadt Farm cultural landscape became part of the park with The 1994. 2004 approval of a boundary expansion. The farm area currently managed by the National Park Service (over 266 acres) is part of the approximately 672 acres that constituted the Allstadt Farm as it existed at the time of John Brown's Raid in October 1859 and the Battle of Harpers Ferry in September 1862.

The Allstadts grew a number of small grains: primarily wheat, along with corn, rye, and oats. In addition to livestock, wheat was one of the most important agricultural commodities produced in the Shenandoah Valley during the late eighteenth and first half of the nineteenth centuries, eventually displacing tobacco culture.

Remaining outbuildings give a view of life in a company town associated with the Standard Lime and Stone Company.

The Allstadts owned quite a few slaves to assist in agricultural production

and increase social standing at that time. The 1850 census gives a count of 13 enslaved persons. The presence of slaves in the area, as well as the proximity of the federal arsenal which could supply weapons to newlyfreed slaves, figured prominantly in John Brown's plan to carry out the raid in Harpers Ferry.

The Allstadt Farm landscape is associated with four distinct areas of significance and periods of history:


• Agricultural history (1793 to 1901) - The farm is an example of a

prosperous farmstead initially farmed by tenants and eventually owned and operated by Pennsylvania Germans, who had migrated to the Shenandoah Valley in the early 1800s.

• Social history (1859 to 1861) - The Allstadt Farm landscape was

- involved with John Brown's Raid on Harpers Ferry, an event that profoundly impacted the issues of slavery and secession at the national
- Military history (1861 to 1865) It was a significant place in the Battle of Harpers Ferry during the Civil War, which culminated in the largest surrender of federal troops during the course of that conflict.

 Industrial history (1901 to 1957) A successful dolomite limestone quarrying operation was established on the property in the early



The Allstadt Farm cultural landscape became part of the park with the Portions of the cultural landscape property are among the earliest acquired by Jacob Allstadt and have been farmed continuously since at least 1793. Crop selection and rotation today is consistant with historic conditions. One historic feature missing from the contemporary landscape appears to be the orchard, which was established in

the 1860s.

Overall, the Allstadt Farm retains integrity in its vegetation since it has remained cleared and used for farming rather than abandoned like many other agricultural properties of the region.

The John Hall Allstadt house and barn were present during the John

Brown Raid and the Battle of Harpers Ferry. Although many of historic buildings of the cultural landscape are in ruinous condition and some have been removed for safety, enough evidence remains to convey their spatial

There are other remaining historic features of the landscape, such as fencing, a well, a cemetery, and roads and railroads. Remaining outbuildings give a view of life in a company town associated with the Standard Lime and Stone Company.
