#### **Ithaca College Senior Sets** Connecticut State Record in **Bench Press**

Since Ithaca College senior David Alstott was a child, he dreamt of breaking a state record of any kind. He was on the swim team in high school, but on April 23, he got his record in the sport of powerlifting. Alstott, a Connecticut native, broke his state's

record in the bench press, pressing 155 kilograms (341.72 pounds), breaking the previous record of 150 kilograms, or 330.7 pounds.

"It means a lot to me," Alstott said. "Ever since I was a kid, whatever sport I was playing, being able to hold a state record for any sport is something I've been striving to do and to finally make that happen is a dream come true, to see all the hard work come to fruition.'

Alstott, who competes in the bench press, said he could not be happier about earning the record. "Being on a team where I have a lot of people to look up to and push myself toward has been really helpful," Alstott said. "The people who are in the gym with me, we have a bit of a community there and we support each other's lifts."

Alstott also said that being a part of this team has been beneficial for him and his well-being. Having a group that supports not only his training but also his social life has helped him balance his life.

Junior Dylan Henderson, one of Alstott's gym friends at the college, said his relationship with Alstott has grown recently through working out together. We are always trying to help each other out and improve, especially lifting each other up and brightening the mood."

'It's cool because you don't see someone rip out heavy weights like it's nothing," Henderson said. "Seeing him compete is cool because you don't get to see many people hit the numbers he is hitting. It's cool to know that I helped him reach this point.

Aside from his gym friends, he said his biggest supporters are, by far, his parents. **Anne Alstott**, David's mother, said she was extremely excited to see him finally accomplish one of his biggest dreams. "I am so thrilled for him," Anne Alstott said. "He is such a hardworking young man and, to see this pay off, I am just so happy for him."

"Ever since he was little, he has been all about hard work and he is so goal-oriented," **Anne Alstott** said. "That's just a part of who he is, he has a real drive.'

Leading up to the meet April 23, David Alstott said he worked for two months to get ready for competition, including rest days and heavy workloads.

#### Gridiron greatness becomes part of Germany experience at NFL

VILSECK, Germany — Soldiers at this Bavarian base got their football fix this week courtesy of an NFL-

Style skills challenge and some face time with two visiting league luminaries of earlier decades. After the meeting with the retired pros, 100 soldiers divided into five-person teams competed Wednesday in the NFL Boot Camp, a test modeled on the combine, a showcase for collegiate players

The competition consisted of a long throw, the broad jump, the 40-yard dash, the three-cone drill and a receiving gauntlet. "I signed up with my friends just to have some fun and play some football," said Staff Sgt. Nathen Gimlin. "It was a lot of fun even though my team didn't perform as well as we thought we were going to.

In addition to the skills camp, soldiers got to talk with 2005 MVP Shaun Alexander, a former Seattle Seahawks running back, and former Tampa Bay Buccaneers fullback **Mike** "A-train" **Alstott**. Alexander said such events mean a lot to him because he has an older bother who served in the Army for 22 years.

He said it was great to be in Germany, adding that he remembers a phone call his brother made from the country during his time overseas. "We wanted to give the military out here an experience they have never had before," Alexander said.

The event was a prelude to Sunday's matchup between the Buccaneers and Seahawks in the firstever NFL game played in Germany.

"It was a great day for them to come out and enjoy some camaraderie," said Michael Hurley, a USAA military affairs representative for Europe and New England. "They came out a little quiet, but boy were they pumped up by the end.'

Wednesday's event was part of the NFL's Salute to Service initiative in partnership with USAA. Gimlin said it was cool to meet players he grew up watching. Soldiers took pictures with Alexander and Alstott and obtained autographs from them before interacting with the two former NFL standouts on the field

The day wrapped up with a trophy ceremony for the top three finishers in the skills challenge as well as a raffle in which four lucky soldiers won tickets to Sunday's game at Allianz Arena in Munich.

Recently, Alstott made the decision to attend Columbia University starting in the fall as a graduate student. After finishing his B.A. in psychology at Ithaca College, he will be joining the School of Psychology at Columbia where he will work for his master's degree in clinical psychology.

"I searched for the best programs in clinical psychology and Columbia was at the top of the list," Alstoft said. "Columbia was my first choice because not only is it a great school, but it also offers the best program for what I want to do, it's in New York City and there are a lot of research opportunities.'



Since there is neither Allenstadt nor Allerstadt as a city or town name in Germany, I assume that the original name was Altenstadt in both cases. And we know a lot of **Altenstadts** in the eastern part of the state of Hesse already. That's where the Altstadts/Altstatts lived in the 17th century.

As in Hünfeld and Grossenbach, Germany -Allenstadt, was originally Altenstadt. Altenstadt can easily be read as Allenstadt or Allerstadt, see the documents below!

On another topic, I believe that your Caspar Altstatt (1673) line back to Hermann Altstatt (c.1625) from Raboldshausen is secured!!!

Also, I found another Catholic line in Paderborn!! I found the death record of Wilhelm Altstadt He died November 11, 1904, and was buried on November 16th. He was 46 years old, which means he was born in 1858 and he was the son of the wagoner Wilhelm Altstadt. Also see the documentation attached.

Next, I attached documentation of a new Catholic line of Altstadts.... from Flörsheim-Dalsheim, Germany!! Flörsheim-Dalsheim belongs to Rhineland-Palatinate, 12 km North-West of Worms and is about a one hour drive to Dreieichenhein.

There is another Flörsheim, West of Dreieichenhain – I believe we visited this place years ago

Beginning with Paul Heinrich and Adam Altstadt, I guess brothers (?), both born around 1700. Their father, also Paul Heinrich, was born ca. 1670-80? I found several generations of Catholic Altstadts! over a period of 200 years!!

about Johann Valentin Asteroth from Treysa, Germany. The book was titled "Das Tagebuch des Sockenstrickers Johann Valentin Asteroth aus Treysa (1766-1831)

Johann Valentin was born on October 12, 1758 in Treysa and his great uncle was Philip Christoff Altstett, born in 1677, son of Heinrich Altstett from Treysa. In 1701, Phillip Christoff Altstett married Maria Elisabeth Asteroth, the daughter of a Sock Knitting Dynasty in Treysa.

Johann Valentin Asteroth left his hometown in 1776 at the age of 18 to fight as a Hessian in the service of the English crown against the Americans who were striving for independence. During his six year adventure abroad, Johann Valentin kept a diary in which he recorded his experiences and observations.

Johan Valentin had an alert mind, he could read and write - that was not a matter of course at the time. He was a friendly guy and he was musical. These qualities led him to be a chaplain's assistant. Therefore, he did not take part in active combat operations while he was in the military.

His Hession Division, under General Huyne, sailed to Long Island in New York. Since he could sing well, he accompanied the services at sea with his singing and received an extra pot of beer. (Remark: Žiegenhain was a garrison location and gathering place for regiments that went to the American Revolutionary War ... and the "sock knitting dynasty" of the Asterodts (Altstadt?) families who knitted a lot of socks for all the Hessian soldiers!!!)



#### An alum's bright idea for portable shelter became a beloved cultural fixture: the Airstream

Some vintage Airstreams are as prized as rare cars. And owning any kind of Airstream seems to ignite a do-it-yourself or decorating obsession, as popularized in countless online photos of customized interiors. Renovated Airstreams have been touted as ideally minimalist homes; at a South African hotel, they've been transformed into rooftop accommodations with majestic views. With Airstreams you get empowerment.

Artist **Susan Altstatt** owns two and every so often includes them in her paintings. "They're beautiful," she says, "they're indestructible, and you can drive off into the wilderness with all the comforts of home."

RALLY TIME: Airstream owners are more than capable of going it alone as adventurers and explorers. But they also have a tradition of being fiercely communal. They've camped in massive flocks for decades; this group of Wally Byam Caravan Club members departed in force from a rally in Wyoming in 1965. Thor Industries, born in 1980 when its cofounders acquired Airstream as a company, recalls the 1950s as the era when travel trailers became "a movement and a culture."

PICTURE PERFECT: Among the things artist Susan Altstatt has graduated from is a 1964 Airstream. She needed something bigger—a 1986 Airstream, to be specific—for trips to places such as Death Valley. She still has the older trailer at her home in Los Altos Hills. But this scene dates to a 2001 sojourn in San Bernardino. She has painted it more than once: It's called Might Even Have to Move Inside and is an acrylic on canvas.

# Tony Alstott and his daughter Ahnya share a never to be forgotten trip to the Wild West!



### On June 16, 2022, Father DAMO celebrated 90 Years!

On July 1, 1952, after 2 more years of college and a year of theology he began a six-year sojourn in Rome: four in theology and two in scripture, he returned to the U.S. in 1961. Before his return he was ordained a deacon at Subiaco's Sacro Speco and later a priest on July 25, 1957. Damian later taught for 47 years as scripture professor at Saint Meinrad School of Theology. His time at SMST endeared him to generations of students —now priests all over the country—and earned him the moniker DAMO, and gifted him a vanity license plate using this nickname.

One of Damian's areas of expertise was the critique of Biblical literature through the lens of women's studies. Thus in the New Testament, stories of women are indications of not only

their presence but also of their influence in Jesus' time.

During the summer months, from 1981 to 2010, he ran the hay baler to feed the cattle at the Assumption Abbey in Richardton, North Dakota. After his years at SMST, he resettled (retired) to the Abbey in 2015., where he assumed his turn in the rotation for the Eucharist.
