This year, we will miss two of our greatest suppliers of information for the 1994 AAA History of the Clans. They were Father Damian "Damo" Dietlein of the line of Heinrich Altstadt (c.1650), pg. 113 and **Billy Joe**"Bill" Altstatt, pg. 256. Damo not only traced his
Altstadt and Dietlein ancestors from Germany to America, but followed them through to current lines and wrote two family history books on these folks. His report makes up the bulk of t he Heinrich/Jacob Altstadt data in the AAAHC book.

On the other hand, Bill stayed in contact with his cousins in Arkansas, Oklahoma and California and countries the period of the period

supplied the section on Daniel Altstatt (grandson of Martin Altstatt (1699) with text and photos. This research was before computers, so everything had to be handled through the postal service. Many thanks to these family documentors!! I am really missing these super guys, who Phyllis and I knew personally from home visits and national reunions.

Discovery student wins Earth Stewardship Awards by Katie Ellington Serrao and Lou Whitmire, Mansfield News Journal on September 12, 2023

Maverick Aldstadt is a budding arborist. He's planted a variety of trees, some of which he raised himself from

seeds. MANSFIELD — When Maverick Aldstadt saw the dozens of downed trees, he knew something had to be done. Aldstadt and the rest of his

Maverick Aldstadt kindergarten class were hiking through the forest beside Discovery School in May after strong windstorms

swept through the region.

Aldstadt and another student asked their teacher if they could replace the trees. Their urgency prompted the school to embark on a mass tree planting project. Students, parents, grandparents and teachers planted nearly 70 saplings in the

school's 20-acre woods.

Aldstadt's desk slowly transformed into a mini nursery. He covered it with cups, filled with soil and various seeds he found in the school woods. Nugent let him work at another table, freeing up his desk

for propagating efforts.

"As Maverick got excited, my other kids got even more excited and it became a daily effort," Nugent said. "We were writing stories about trees every day, we were reading books about trees every day." "It challenged me as a teacher to come up with new books and new things."

Then he started growing trees at home, too. Friends gave him a sequoia tree kit. His family got seeds from the Arbor Day Foundation. Aldstadt planted them in pots and his backyard.

"He'd bring bags of pinecones, acorns, sweet gum tree pods home that he would find at school," said Aldstadt's mother Brooke.

Aldstadt was honored for his tree-panting efforts Friday during the 27th Anniversary Earth Stewardship Celebration in downtown Mansfield. The 6-year-old won two awards — a second-place award in the neighborhood category as well as a

"It's very special," **Brooke Aldstadt** said. "I'm very proud of him and I know he's proud too."

ways...yes! My quest for where the **Allstott** families came from dates back to the 1960s. Back before computers, back before the internet or Wikipedia. No one had passed anything down from my grandfather, **Arthur Allstott**.

Arthur's dad died when he was 8-years old. A real deadend. In the Houston, TX public library I came across a book on Revolutiomary War pensioners. One

Alstott Sports Updates

Football: Former Tampa Bay Buccaneer star Mike Alstott steps down as coach at Northside Christian after 11 seasons

During Alstott's tenure with the Mustangs, the program made the playoffs seven times, including a state semifinal appearance in 2016.



No timetable has been set for his replacement. Alstott is the second former Buccaneers player who stepped down from high school coaching in the past month, joining Michael Clayton, who decided to leave Plant City after one season.

Alstott, a six-time Pro Bowl selection during his 12-year career with the Bucs, was known for plowing through defenders on knock-down, drag-out runs. He won a Super Bowl with the team during the 2002 season and is in the Bucs' Ring of Honor.

In 2010, Alstott started coaching in the youth league at Seminole. The following year he moved to the high school ranks as a volunteer assistant at St. Petersburg Catholic, where he worked with Ryan Green, considered one of the nation's top running back recruits at the time.

In 2012, Northside Christian turned its attention to Alstott, who school administrators knew was certain to draw crowds at games by virtue of his name alone. Making a winner of the Mustangs was far less certain. After all, it was the first head coaching job for Alstott. He took over a program that had fewer than 20 players on varsity by the end of the 2011 season and no junior varsity team. Northside had not made the playoffs

After going 0-10 his first season and 3-7 the following year, Alstott turned things around with consecutive 8-3 seasons and playoff appearances in 2014-15.

In 2016, the Mustangs made their first and only state semifinal appearance. They also have made the playoffs each of the past four seasons 2019-22.

Editor's note: The AAA newsletter has followed the career of **Mike Alstott** from his Purdue days, through his Tampa Bay Buccs days and his coaching days at Northside Christian. With his retirement, this Alstott Sports section will retire also and see what Alstott sports personality will come to the forefront.

and I were off to Oregon.

We found that the Oregon **Allstotts** were not kin to our line, but their family historian, Pat Kennedy and I got our heads together and started digging. The flood gates opened. We soon discovered that **John**

Now on to Phyllis and my activities in 2023. Yes, we spent time with the kids in Pigeon Forge, Tennesse. Every five years, we do something SPECIAL. Rather than just jumping on a plane and visiting the kids at their homes in Lake Jackson, TX and Euharlee, GA. We "pulled" everyone together and in 2023, we all elected to go to "Dollywood." (That came in first ahead of Branson, MO")

We sent out word in the early part of 2022, and sat back to see who would be able to come. We had 26 positive responses. WOW! So we rented a cabin in Pigeon Forge for the bunch. **Anne Allstott** and Cherilyn Vaughan said that they would buy the grub locally and cook. Tim Vaughan cooked

Allstott had settled in Pennsylvania from Germany and that Allstott was not the only spelling of the family name. Soon we were finding Alstotts, Alstots, Allstots, etc. and eventually came across the Atstatt spelling. Pat came across Judy Castle Stubbs and the USA and Canada opened up not only John Allstotts (Altstatts) line back to his grandfather Martin Altstatt, our original Altstatt immigrant. In 1986, I wrote and published a genealogy on the descendants of Hans Merten Altstatt.

1989 was the 260th anniversary year of when **Martin** and **Judith Altstatt** traveleď from Germany to settle in America. "The bee was in my bonnet." Wouldn't it be super to have a get-together of all the folks who sent in their family data for the '86 Altstatt history book? So, invitations were sent out for a grand picnic on the lawn of the **Jacob** Allstadt farm in Charles Town, West Virginia. This farm was owned in 1859 by John Hall Allstadt, a hostage of John Brown in 1859 at Harpers Ferry West Virginia (formerly Virginia). The picnic was hosted by Forrest Hoffmaster, of the **John Hall Allstadt** clan. After the picnic, we would all drive up to Berks County, Pennsylvania, the county were Martin and Judith settled and have a grave side service at the recently found gravesite of Judith Altstatt. 90 invitations went out and 180 cuzzins showed up! That was the start of the AAA Reunions which lasted every five years from 1989 to 2017.

At that reunion, **John** and **Susan Altstatt**, along with their two daughters attended. I found that John, who had been invited by **Everett Aldstadt**, was not of the line of **Martin Altstatt**, but of the line of **Valentine Altstatt**. Another bunny trail was shaping up.

In addition to helping **John Altstatt** with researching his line, I came across other **Altstadts**, in fact over 20 other immigrant **Altstadt/Altstatts**. That being the case, I compiled another book on all the descendants of as many **Allstatt/Altstadt/**

Outside of that, we have been homebodies this year. My biggest project, since September 2022 has been six 2'x4' acrylic paintings (see later in the AAANL) done for a long hallway at our church.

I finished the last one in September 2023. Taking around 2-months apiece to paint, I haven't had much time for anything away from my drawing board.

Altstatt spellings as I could find in the census records at the Los Angeles LDS Genealogy Library...writing to other immigrant lines...even spending time on the phone talking to Ewald Wuschke (Canadian Altstadt line) in Alberta.

German phonebooks were available at the library, so I wrote to all the lines of **Altstadts** in Germany in those phone books to see if they would send me information on their family trees...and many did. Aided by 61 cuzzins in the states and incoming

Aided by 61 cuzzins in the states and incoming letters from Germany, I began compiling a book on as many **Allstadts/Altstadts/Altstatts** as I could find and took two years to complete the *History of the Clans*, which was published in 1994.

Upon retirement in 1998, I thought it might be great for Phyllis and I to visit **Caspar Altstadt's** town of Dreieichenhain, Germany. **Johann Martin Altstatt** being his oldest son was born in Dreieichenhain and immigrated to the British Colonies in 1729.

Phyllis and me enjoyed the trip so much that I started brainstorming ways we could escort a group of American cuzzins to see their immigrant home towns. Forrest Hoffmaster had a friend, Charlie Otstot, who had booked genealogical tours to Europe and gave me his tour information.

It was still a dream in 2000 when I received an e-mail from **Hermann Altstadt** of Erlangen, Germany, who had somehow found that I had written a genealogical book on **Altstadts**. He had American cousins living in Nebraska and wanted to see the connection. Hermann and I became good friends (eventually unofficial brothers) over the internet and I told him of my desire to bring cuzzins over to Germany to see their AAA root home towns.

So...in 2001, Hermann and I met at the Frankfurt Airport and took a week together to visit the towns in Hessen, Germany where our immigrant ancestors grew up. I had compiled a map. Hermann, an engineer for Siemens, spoke both fluent German and fluent English. What could be better.

Cuzzin Contacts...

Dear Jerry,

Sending a belated thanks for the 2022 annual newsletter. I especially enjoyed the story about visualizing the Rev War Allstots in the back rowboats, in the famous painting of George Washington crossing the Delaware. I will have to drag my own progeny to pose by that painting!

My husband Cameron White is descended from Jacob Allstott (1786-1830??) and wife Anna Barnaby, through their daughter Lucinda Allstot, wife of David

Allen Apple.

Lucinda is described in the family website as their one known daughter - but I recently discovered a second daughter **Mary Allstott**. I've traced her descendants as much as I can and added them to my mother-in-law's public tree on ancestry.com, "Eunice Irene Davis aka Irene Miller (b 1930 Seminole OK), and wondering if you want to add her line to the family website. I'll send an invite to you and John, who I am cc'ing since I saw him listed in the newsletter as well for updates to the website.

This all happened because I subscribed to newspapers.com, and was tracing newspaper mentions of Lucinda and the entire David Allen Apple family. Lucinda and husband ended up being early settlers in Barry County, Missouri, where their sons were successful businessmen. Lucinda lived a long life, and is referred to a few times in the local paper as "Grandma Apple." Then I came across a blurb in the local newspaper in 1900, after Lucinda is widowed, about her sister "Mrs. Charles from Joplin" visiting, that says the two sisters have not seen each other for 20 years!!! I remembered how the **Allstot** website always had Lucinda as the "only known daughter" and dove into the records to find the mystery sister.

It took me some digging but eventually I figured out the elusive "Mrs Charles." She was Lucinda's older sister, first married to a Samuel Danforth, with two children. Either they divorced or he died (there are multiple Samuel Danforths in the records). But in any case Mary then married a much older gentleman named Azor Charles. She was with him briefly until his death, but can be traced thanks to living with her Danforth children, then her grandchildren, on the census records. In 1900 Mary Charles appears in Joplin, and I found her Find-A-Grave memorial in Kansas.

In a gruesome separate newspaper blurb, Mary's son died when struck by lightening while riding his horse. (the horse survived). Mary outlived her daughter Eliza Danforth too, but the daughter did marry a Dixon and leave children. So there may be other descendants researching someday, who will find your website as helpful as I did, for this branch.

Let me know if you agree with my research and want to add **Mary Allstott** (18 Aug 1825 Indiana - 25 Nov 1907 KS) and her descendants to your website.

You may recall that our great grandmother was **Emma B. Alstott** (page 220 in your book). She is the daughter of civil war John Alstott, who is the son of Daniel, who is the son of Revolutionary War **John**

Alstott.

It seems like Daniel and his connection to his father and his son, was what was hard for the organization to prove.

I was also curious about any records (pension,

etc.) for Revolutionary John. Do you know how we

can get copies of these.

Anyway, thanks again for your time and help. We love your book and think you did such a great job on it.

Dear cuzzin Doug,

I looked back in my records and couldn't find our last correspondence either. So let me send what I know about the **John Altstatt** (Alstott) (1755) - **Daniel** Alstott(1791) connection.

Since you are familiar with the AAA Family History Book - - You will see the initial chart on Johann Martin Altstatt (our immigrant ancestor) on page 139. Listed there is Martin's son Nicholas (1727) Nicholas' son, John Altstatt (Alstott) (1755) and

John's son - Daniel Alstott (your ancestor) (1791). Now go to page 170/171 and you will find the application of John Altstatt for his Revolutionary War pension in his own handwriting. Next go to page 172/173 and see his second pension application request (the pension was approved). Lastly go to page 176/177 and see **William Alstot's** request for the children of **John Alstatt** (John and his wife Margaret had already passed away). This request also included a paper (probably from the family bible) which showed the children of **John** and Margaret Altstatt in John's handwriting.

All of this original paperwork is on file in the Archives in Washington DC. And were copied by me on one of my trips to DC before I wrote the 1994 AAA book. The records for Daniels family and future generations continue on page 220 - 225. These records are taken from census data and from input from others in your **Daniel Alstott** line as I prepared the book. My sources (Canadian side) have since passed

Good Luck!!!!! And let me know if you are successful. Others in the family could really profit from your experience on this!!! Cuzzin Jerry

Fr. Damian Dietlein pg. 113 June 16, 1932 — December 30, 2022



Richardton, North Dakota Reverend Father Damian (Leo) Dietlein passed away at Assumption Abbey in the early hours of December 30, 2022, attended by members of the monastic community. He was ninety years old, in his seventieth year of monastic profession, and his sixty-fifth year as a priest.

Born on June 16, 1932, to Peter and Regina (Heembrock) Dietlein, in Emmons County, ND,

Leo Edward attended a one-room schoolhouse nearby, then spent four years in high school at Assumption Abbey. He followed his older brother Francis (Father Raymond) into the Benedictine community, receiving the habit and the name Damian on June 25, 1951.

He was sent to St. John's College, Collegeville, MN, where he earned a double major in philosophy and English literature in 1954. He made simple vows in 1952 and solemn vows in 1955. That same year he was sent off to Rome, where all classes were in Latin. In 1957 he received a Licentiate in Sacred Theology (STL) from Sant' Anselmo. He was also ordained to the priesthood. From the Biblicum he received a Licentiate in Sacred Scripture (SSL) in 1961. Returning to Assumption Abbey, he taught Latin and Greek in the high school and junior college, and Scripture and Dogma in the Abbey's seminary. He was appointed prior in 1967.

In July of 1968 he took up teaching at St. Meinrad Seminary in Indiana, later becoming a professional member of the American Academy of Religion, the Society of Biblical Literature, and the Catholic Biblical Association. He never stopped being a strapping farm boy, however, and returned to Richardton every summer to cut and bale hay on the Abbey farm.

In 1971, St. John's University asked him to be on their team for designing a deacon program for married men. In 1975 he became chairman of the Personnel and Curriculum Committee at St. Meinrad. He became a member of the CBA Task Force on Feminist Biblical Hermeneutics in 1989. Proof of his interest can be seen in the nearly three hundred feminist books he brought home to the Abbey library. Through the CBA he attended sessions all over the country. At St. Meinrad, he was, time and again, elected faculty moderator and served on many committees. He developed a course on women in the Old Testament, another on women leadership roles in early Christianity, and mentored female students in the school.

In all, he taught forty-seven years at St. Meinrad. He began teaching there at the age of thirty-six and retired in 2015 at the age of eighty-three.

Father Damian always maintained a keen interest in his own family and did much research on Dietlein and Altstadt history. He remained connected with nieces and nephews, and great nieces and nephews. In September of 2022, a CT scan showed a mass

in his chest. Because he had become a member of the 90 Club—only the 10th person among all our Abbey history to become a nonagenarian. He continued to attend Mass and the Divine Office up until three days before his death. His last hours were brave, full of hope for what lies beyond.

Damian was preceded in death by his parents, his four siblings and their spouses.

Altstadt research at Lubeck, Germany

I have a compilation of Altstadts/Alstedts, Alstedes... of Lübeck from around 1400 to 1775. They were citizens of Lübeck or boarded the ship in Lübeck.

According to my previous research, they were merchants and craftsmen who settled primarily in East Prussia, in the Königsberg area, Gdansk, Reval (Tallinn)/Estonia, Riga/Latvia.The City of Königsberg has been a member of the Hanseatic League since 1340.

1399 - **Everhard van der Alstede** (from (Lübeck or Westphalia) - Stayed in Gdansk for some time. Mentioned in "Hansische Geschichtsblätter" (*The Hanseatic History Review is the scientific journal of the Hansischen History Association*)

1428 - **Hans Alstede** – (from (Lübeck or Westphalia) Merchant in Tallinn or Gdansk

1447 - **Johann van der Alstede** (from (Lübeck or Westphalia) - Merchant in Tallinn

1467 - **Hermen Alstede** – Citizen of Lübeck, Merchant in Hamburg

1570 - Herman or/and Hermann Werner Altstedt/Alstedt or Alstede - Citizen of Lübeck 1611 - Joachim Werner Altstedt, Citizen of Lübeck - Court brewer in Stockholm/Sweden 1621 - Hans Altstadt - A merchant from Westphalia - Becomes a Citizen of Königsberg/East Prussia 1641 - Catharina Altstede (from (Lübeck or Westphalia) married Peter von Cöllen, Merchant. We jumped into his Volkswagen Bus and off we went. The route we took was to be mostly followed in the fall of 2003.





On returning home from this initial sorte, I called Charlie Otstot and he set up the tour with Kuoni Travel of Switzerland. (Kuoni specializes in genealaogical tours). You tell the tour director where you want to go, and settle back while they take you there. Isn't

So, in the fall of 2003, 32 cuzzins set a whirlwind pace circling the heart of Germany in the space of 12 days! During that time we visited the ancestoral hometowns of 20 of the 27 **Allstadt**/**Altstadt** immigrants to America and walked in their footsteps.

Our group of cuzzins left Dulles Airport in Washington, DC. on September 13, 2003, at 9:30 pm on United Airlines arriving in Frankfurt at around 11:30 am on Sunday, September 14.

That's where we initially met Elisabeth "Mrs. Doubtfire" Lutz, of Switzerland's Kuoni Travel, our tour director, in the baggage area of the airport.

Following Elisabeth outside the terminal...we boarded our coach. Driver, Roel Koppmans, then headed north to the Hessenpark for lunch at the "Zum Adler" with **Fritz** and **Gisela Allstädt**, their daughter, of Bad Homburg, and their son Hansjörg Allstädt,

introducing his daughter. **Fritz's** grandfather had immigrated to Indiana in the late 19th century, but his wife became homesick and they returned to Germany.

After lunch we return to the Autobahn and drove to Marburg. (Ancestral home of David Altstadt). At Marburg we checked into our hotel and met our city tourguide for a walking tour of the Elisabeth Kirche and the Altstadt (oldest part of town). When we turned in for the

babies from such a long day. On September 15, we drove through scenic wooded areas to the base of Weidelsburg Castle ruins (Alahstad Castlein the 9th century)... the oldest known Altstadt site in Germany. After breakfast on September 16, we left Bad Hersfeld for Grossenbach (Ancestral home of Georg Altstadt) for a special Mass. Father Bernard Merz then gave us a tour of the church, in English, and brought out an old church book which

The Catholic church at Grossenbach recorded the christening of Johann Georg Altstadt in 1831! This was one of the high points of the tour. Just ask Cuzz **Fuzz Hammers!**





Next we visited Weisenfeld (ancestral home of Otto Altstadt) for a brief stop and then headed past "Checkpoint Alpha" into "old" East Germany on our way to Fulda. At Fulda we saw the huge Cathedral, St. Michael's Church, and the City Palace.

night...we slept like American and German Altstadts/Allstädts met for the first time at the Hessenpark near Bad Homburg for lunch.
